This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. # Part A: Curriculum music

All classes have weekly music lessons:

- Year R/1 40 minutes a week plus daily singing
- Year 2 6 70 minutes a week

#### Instruments used in lessons:

- Untuned percussion
- Voice
- Xylophones
- Keyboards

- Ocarinas
- Recorders
- Ukuleles

Children sing ensemble three times a week in school assemblies using the catalogue on songs found at sparkyard.com

# Part B: Extra-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Pupils are able to access the following additional music experiences:

- IRock group band classes: vocals, keyboard, drums, guitar 30 minutes a week
  via monthly parent direct debit. Pupil premium children funded by school/iRock
  bursary. Children in Year 2, 4 and 6 will be able to achieve an entry level
  qualification with iRock without the anxiety of formal exam.

### In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

We are proud of the strong position our music provision is already in. For two years, we have had a qualified teacher with music specialism teaching all classes weekly. Our curriculum is bespoke, and engages and inspires all children. Lessons are well planned, focusing on both musical theory and practice across a diverse range of composers and genre. All children have the opportunity to explore and compose their own pieces, performing them frequently both informally and in front of parents each term. Children learn to play a good range of instruments with additional opportunities available. The highlight of our year is our Young Voices concert at the O2.We plan to sustain all of the above excellent provision, with the hope of developing our choir and musicians to perform more frequently and for our pupils to collaborate with their peers at Hadlow School.
